



Pinworms	Itching around the anus, especially at night	Prescription medication
Viral Gastroenteritis (Stomach Flu)	Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, fever	Rest, fluids, electrolytes
Food Poisoning	Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain	Rest, fluids, electrolytes
Urinary Tract Infection (UTI)	Burning sensation when urinating, frequent urination, cloudy urine	Antibiotics
Thrush	White patches on the inside of the mouth	Anti fungal medication
Scarlet Fever	Fever, rash, sore throat	Antibiotics
Fifth Disease	Fever, rash, joint pain	Rest, fluids

Roseola	Fever, rash	Rest, fluids
Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease	Fever, rash on the hands, feet, and mouth	Rest, fluids
Molluscum Contagiosum	Small, raised bumps on the skin	No treatment necessary, usually goes away on its own




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
